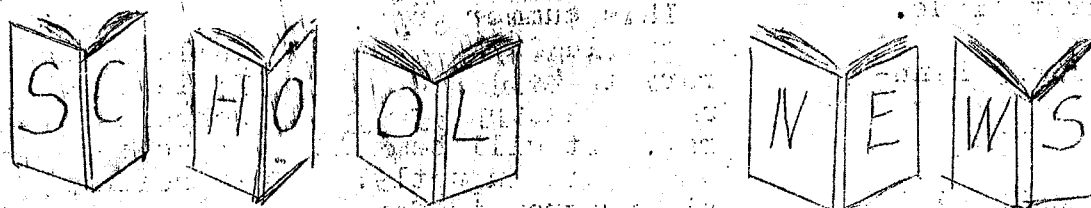
The members of the Western Wind-Up Staff wish to thank our Parent Teacher Association for providing the paper and the stencils for our school newspaper again this year.

In the last screening two children were chosen in each class to represent each of the elementary schools.

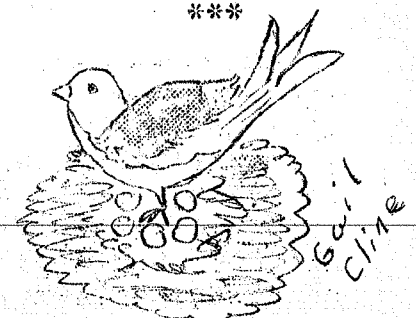

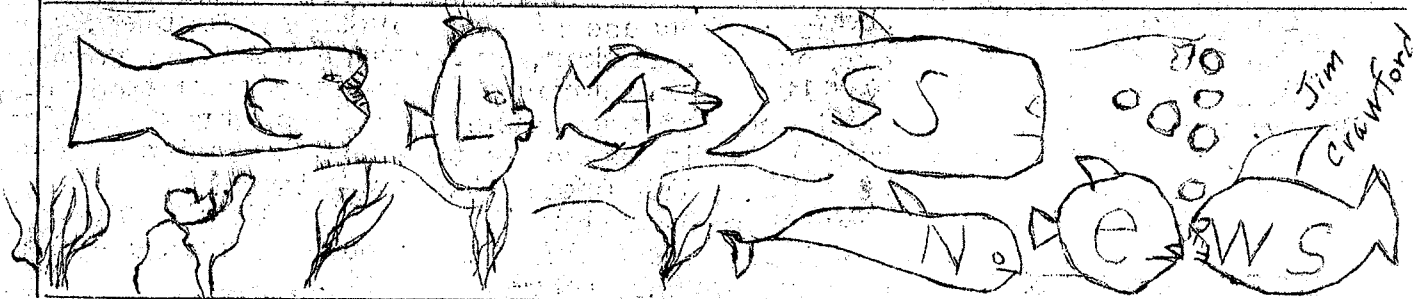

The Canton Provision factory covers about a small city block. It serves the Northeast part of Ohio.

There are eighteen freezers in the factory and the temperature is between 34 - 42. Their electric bill is \$3,000.00 a month. About 300 people work in the factory. This meat-house has been in operation 61 years. They get their pigs and cattle from Chicago.

On our trip we saw how the smoke-house worked. We also saw how they cut bologna and bacon and put them into packages.

In the hot-dog kitchen a boy asked our guide why there were black stripes on the cellophane on the hot-dogs. Our guide said if they weren't on there, a hot-dog with cellophane on it might get in a package. The hot-dog packager cost \$1800.

From the Canton Provision Co. we each received a round package of hot-dogs and 3 pencils.

One Friday in April our class went to Mrs. Poffenbaugh's room. She told us about her pen pal in Japan.

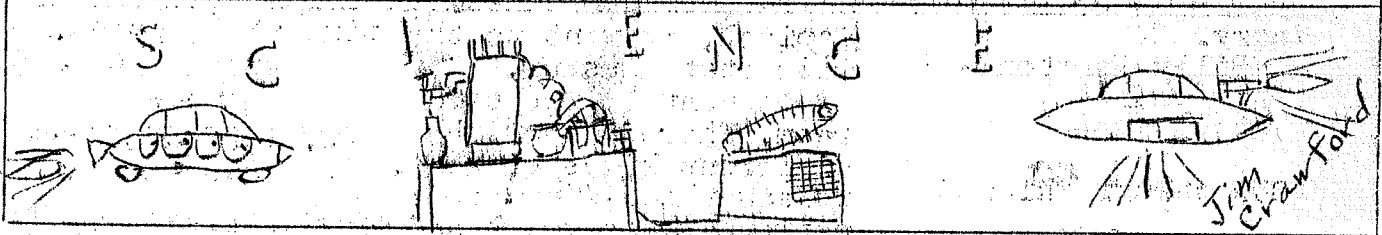

WHY GLUE STICKS THINGS TOGETHER

Like everything else in the world, glue is made up of many tiny separate bits called molecules. Each molecule works somewhat like a magnet. It pulls the neighboring glue molecules toward it. We say it attracts them. A glue molecule also attracts the molecules of paper and wood and other materials. This attraction becomes very strong when the glue gets dry. The molecules pull hard on each other and on the materials that need to be held together, and so it makes them stick tight.

Stretch a rubber band between the thumb and a finger of one hand. Then pluck the two strands gently. They wiggle back and forth very fast. When the strands vibrate they make the air vibrate too, and so you hear a kind of purring noise.

Your cat has little stretchable bands in its throat. They are a special living part of the cat's body. When a cat feels relaxed

and satisfied, it can make the bands vibrate in its throat. As the cat breathes, the air picks up the vibrations, and so the sound of purring is carried to your ears.

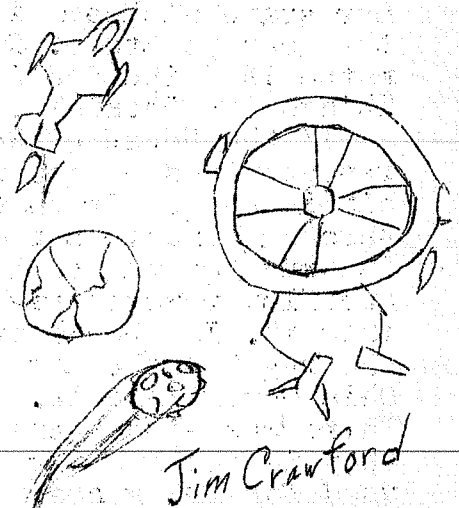

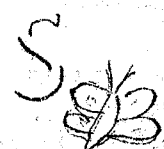
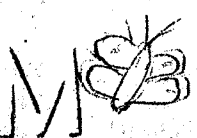
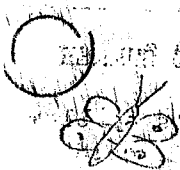
THE CIVIL WAR

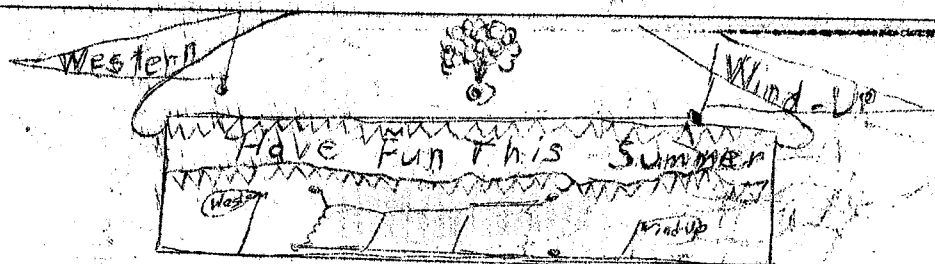

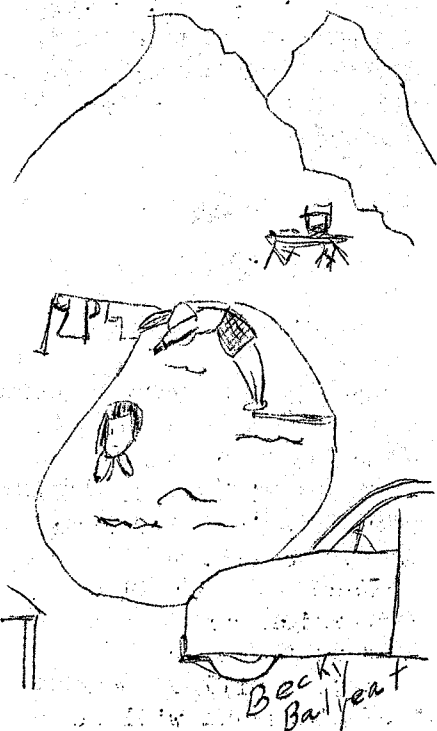

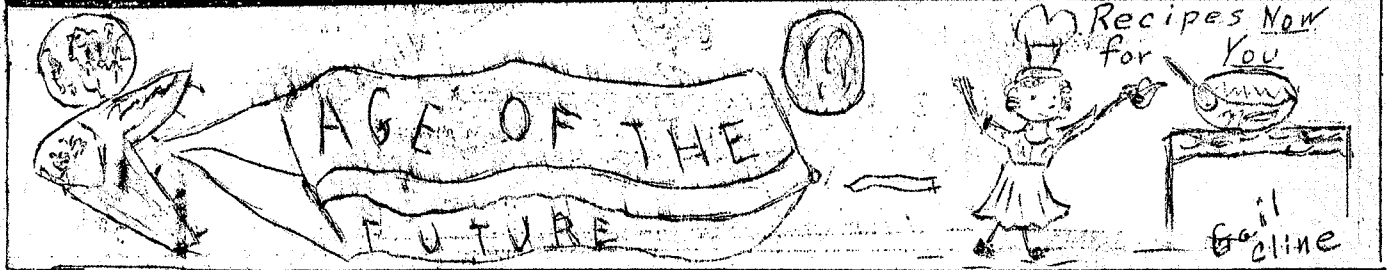

$1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted flour
 $1\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon baking powder
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup granulated sugar
4 tablespoons soft butter
1 egg, well beaten
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 tablespoons butter
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar, firmly packed
4 slices pineapple (wedged)
1 cup broken pecan meats

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt and sugar and sift three times. Add butter. Combine egg, milk & vanilla. Add to flour mixture stirring until all flour is dampened, then beat vigorously one minute. Melt 4 tablespoons butter in an 8x8x2 inch pan or 8 inch skillet over low flame. Add brown sugar, cook and stir until mixed. On this arrange pineapple wedges and sprinkle with nuts. Turn batter out on content of pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 50 minutes or until done. Turn upside down on dish and garnish with whipped cream.

MALABAR FARM

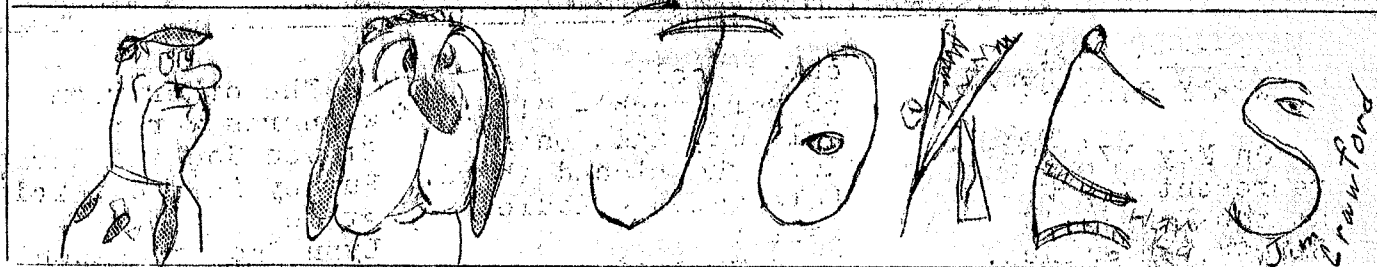
On May 24 our two fifth grades went to Malabar Farm. Dr. Chapman and Mr. Garner were our guides on the nature trails.
