MAKING SOAP

6 Pounds of clean fat (tallow, lard or both)
1 Can of Lye
2½ Pints cold water

Slowly add lye to water. Stir until dissolved. Melt fat and let cool. Pour lye solution into melted fat in a thin steady stream with slow even stirring. Continue to stir for 10 to 20 minutes until it becomes texture of thick honey. Pour into a wooden or cardboard box and cover with cloth to retain heat. Let stand 24 hours. Cut in bars and remove from box so air can reach it. Keep in dry even temperature for two weeks. Aging improves soap.

KRISPIE COOKIES

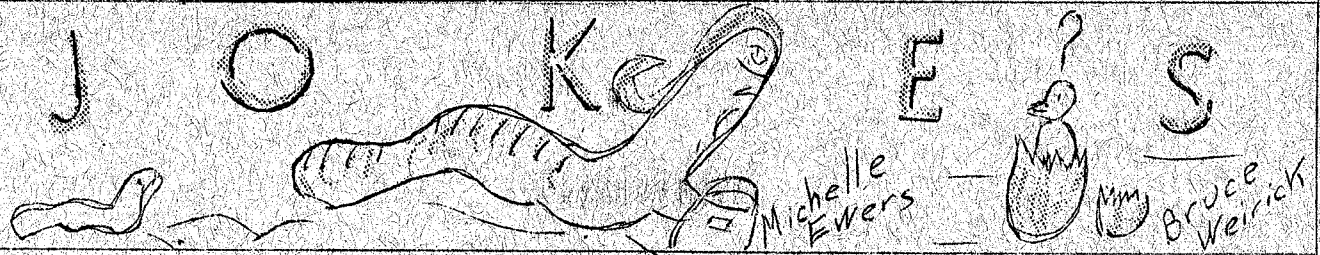
1 cup butter
