FAVORITE BOOK DAY

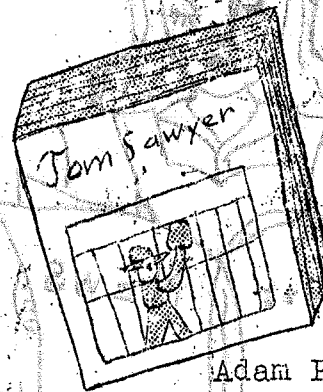
Friday we brought our favorite books to school. Then we showed the books to the class and told the interesting part about it.
