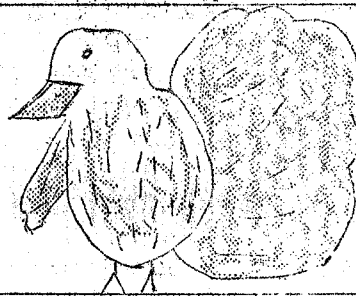
THE WEBELOS SCOUTS

OUR SOCIAL STUDIES MAP

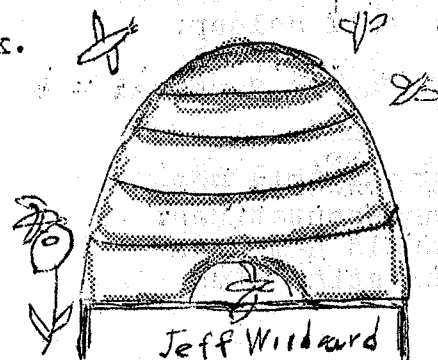

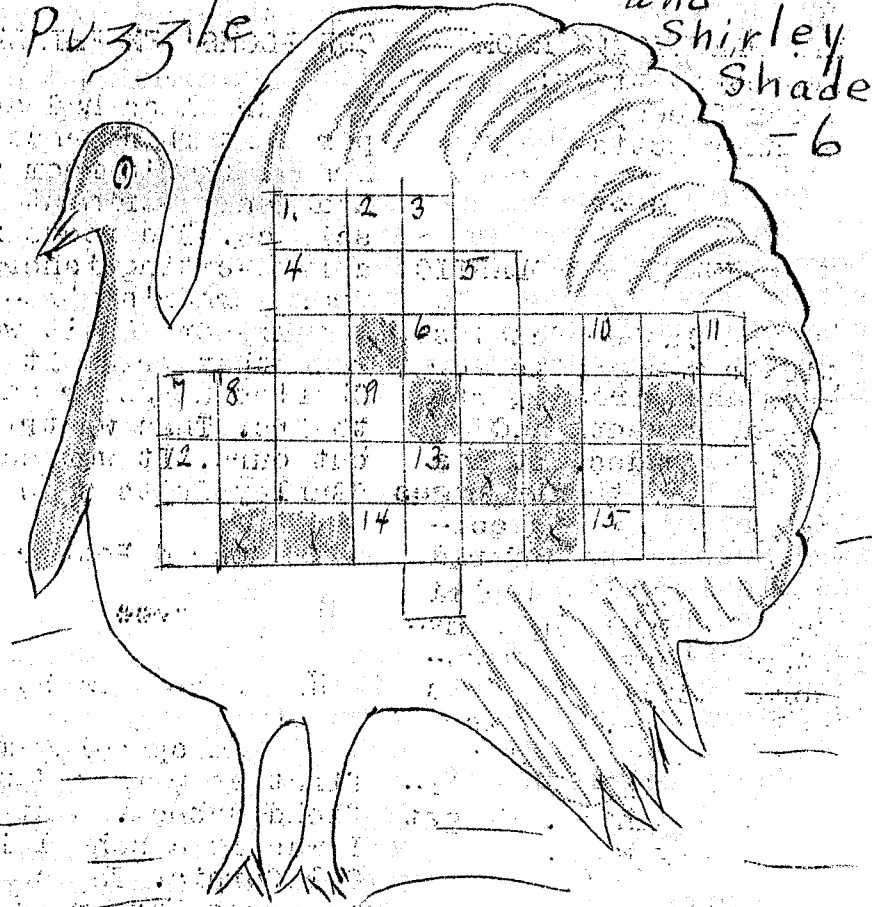

Fold in 9 oz. can crushed pineapple. Spoon into baked short pie shell and freeze 2 hours. Strawberries on top a nice, too.

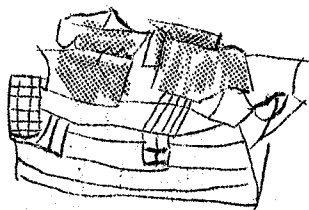

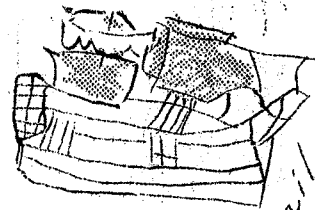
