



She said if she hadn't liked teaching boys and girls so well she would have done something else for a living.

OUR AQUARIUM





We have a family of 30 children in our room, and have had lots of fun learning to read. We have already read one book about Alice and Jerry, and liked it a lot.


We've had fun watching the men work on the new part of our school house, and even went to our windown and watched them pour the concrete for the thick floor one morning.


