

We are trying to bring in pictures to hang on the bulletin board. We put a frame around the pictures to make them stand out on our bulletin board.

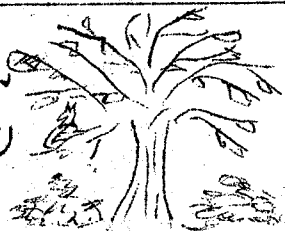

The Cub Scouts went to a baseball game, Saturday, to see the Cleveland Indians and the Detroit Tigers. We went in private cars. We took a sack lunch.

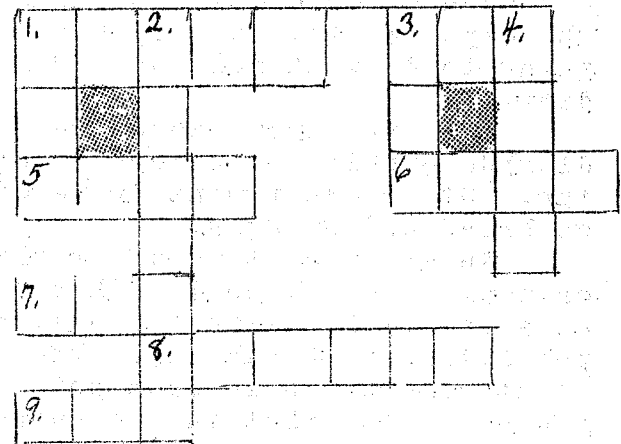

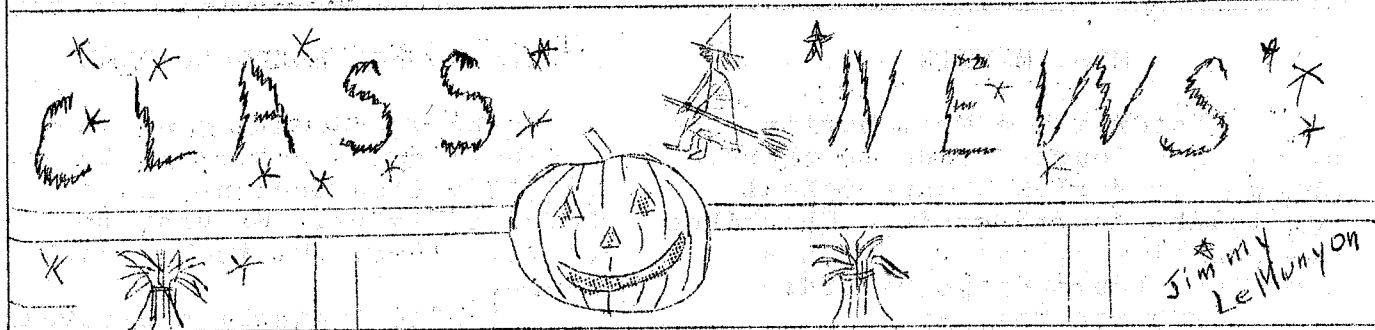

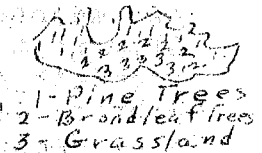
The map of Canada shows the vegetation just as it was when European settlers came. There are still some woods standing that were there, when they came.

JOHN CABOT



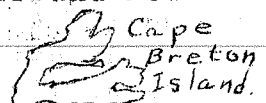
John Cabot was an Italian, whose real name was Giovanni Caboto. He believed a ship could reach Asia by sailing west, but he didn't have enough money for an expedition. After Columbus had discovered land across the Atlantic ocean, the Bristol merchants agreed to send Cabot. John Cabot had eighteen men, for a crew, and one small ship, the "Mathew." He sailed to the west.

On June 24, 1497, Cabot landed on Cape Breton Island. They had a formal ceremony, in which Cabot set up the English flag and claimed the land for King Henry VII.

Cabot saw trees that had been chopped with a tool-traps set for small animals, but he saw no people. Cabot and his crew caught many fish just by lowering weighted baskets into the water, and pulling them up full of codfish. That probably is true because some of the best fishing grounds, in the world, are around the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

On his second journey, in the spring of 1498, Cabot came back to North America. This time he had two ships and his son Sebastian, was with him. The merchants of Bristol had supplied him with trading goods. He traded with the Indians around Newfoundland.
