He started inventing right after the War between the States. He invented the Electric Light, the Phonograph, the Motion Picture Camera and Projector. He invented the Electric Motor, Telephone Transmitter, and the Dictating Machine.

Al was deaf. He didn't mind because he said he could concentrate better that way.
